


PLANT PROFILE: TOWN OF SMITHERS WATER SUPPLY

The town of Smithers' water supply consists of three separate deep wells which supply drinking water to approximately 5,700 residents. The total pumping rate from the three wells is 150 litres/second or about 13 million litres/day. There is only one pressure zone. Water is pumped to the distribution system and is stored in

two separate reservoirs, which hold 900 M³ and 4600 M³ of water. The larger reservoir is an above ground concrete tank and the smaller reservoir is an underground concrete tank.

The operation of the wells is controlled with digital communication between the reservoirs and the wells over telephone lines. Each station has an alarm panel, a PLC and a modem. An alarm and monitoring station is located at the Public Works Yard for monitoring the system. This recently installed system can easily be upgraded to a full SCADA system in the future.

Editor's Notes

Spring is here and so are the two main events of the year for operator training. First, the BCWWA Annual Conference is being held in Whistler once again, from April 26th to the 29th. The program has many sessions of interest to both water and wastewater operators. There are sessions describing treatment plant upgrades in Whistler, Salmon Arm, French Creek and Prince George. Operators are co-presenters for these sessions as well. On the water side there are sessions on conservation strategies. cold climate issues, and chlorination problems. Other sessions operators may be interested in include odor control at wastewater treatment plants, inflow and infiltration, and biosolids. Once again, there will be a safety competition, and an exam session.

The UBC Operator School runs from May 11th to 15th. There is a wide variety of courses, from full five day courses to one day courses. These are listed on the back page of the *Digest*.

Every May is election time for the EOCP Board.

Certification Board Business

Highlights from the Meeting of the EOCP Board of Directors, February 2, 1998 in Vancouver.

- The Treasurer's Report was received. The 1997 Revenue was \$110,370 and the Expenses were \$102,772. Total assets were \$62,103.
- The Chairman presented his report stating that a meeting had taken place between the BCWWA executive and the EOCP Chairman. Both associations are keen to work with each other to maintain training and certification. The BCWWA is working on developing additional training for small systems and industrial wastewater treatment. The Auditor General is doing a report on water management in the province which may help our cause for mandatory water treatment and distribution. The joint committee of BCWWA and EOCP will continue their pitch toward this end. We are receiving a lot of inquiries from pulp mill wastewater treatment operators wishing to write municipal certification exams.
- Bernie Taekema reported that many small wastewater treatment facilities are making inquiries regarding plant classification and operator certification.

The water quality of the three wells complies with the Canadian Drinking Water Standards, except for manganese which exceeds the acceptable limit of 0.05ppm. The Town does not chlorinate the water supply except for a four week period each fall when the complete distribution system is flushed. The Town does add fluoride.

The Town of Smithers water system is classified as a Level I system by the EOCP. The system is operated and maintained by Errol Franson, who also maintains the Town's Level I wastewater treatment plant.

- There was continued discussion regarding the appointment of an Industrial Director to the Board. The Constitution would have to be revised to include on the Board a Director from Industrial Management plus the addition of a Director that is an industrial operator as the majority of Board members must be operators. The Board would like to hear operators' opinions on the subject. Operators can call, fax or email their opinions to the Board Office.
- The nominations for the Vic Terry Award closed March 2, and the Board will make its recommendation to the BCWWA, for presentation at the BCWWA Conference in Whistler.
- DRC Time Forms will be sent out with annual renewal letters to each wastewater treatment facility. These forms will record how DRC is allocated in each plant, e.g. how many employees earn DRC and how many shifts are run in the plant, etc.



- The Board resolved that as per ABC guidelines, for Class III and IV operators, a maximum of 90 CEU's of post-high school education may be substituted for 2 years experience; however, the applicant must still have 1 year of DRC experience.
- The Board will have all certificates sealed with the EOCP logo and name, to ensure that the certificate is authentic and original.
- The Board resolved that the EOCP will pay \$800 (1/3 of costs - BCWWA to pay 2/3 costs) to Dave McLean to promote operator training and certification; as a pilot project in the areas of northern Vancouver Island and the Kootenays.

NEW WCB OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY REGULATIONS

On April 15, 1998, British Columbia will have a new set of workplace safety standards: the *Occupational Health and Safety Regulation*. Produced over six years, the new standards - 4,000 regulations in total - represent an historical achievement for the employer and worker representatives who participated in their development.

Representatives of government agencies, suppliers and building owners, as well as WCB health and safety professionals, also sat on the 33 committees and working groups established to address industry-and hazard-specific topics. Virtually every B.C. regulation on workplace health and safety was reviewed, and the WCB solicited opinions from the working committees and public on all changes. In the end, it is estimated that more than 100,000 person-hours of development work went into producing the new regulations.

The importance of consultation to a successful outcome cannot be underestimated, says **McGinn**, WCB vice-president of Prevention and head of regulation review. "This approach is time-consuming and requires a lot of patience, but it's critical that employers and workers participate. They are most familiar with the issues and how to solve them efficiently. And their involvement ensures that all interests - in safety, practicability, and cost - are brought forward."

John Weir, director of occupational safety and health for the B.C. Federation of Labour, agrees. As coordinator for the worker caucus, he saw "high value in drawing in such practical advice, and in sharing perspectives between those working with regulations day to day and those from the Board with technical expertise."

Kent Hillman of B.C. Hydro's Corporate Safety Division sat on the occupational hygiene committee as an employer representative. "Yes, the process was slow," he says, "but it was entirely necessary and we have a better product because of it."

"Making regulations is making decisions," Hillman explains, "and for that you need accuracy and acceptance. The only way you can assure getting both is by having stakeholders at the table."

Smaller committees, such as the one Hillman sat on, were the backbone of the review, according to **Mike Arbogast**, vice-president, consulting services, of the B.C. Health Employer Association. He served as coordinator of the employer caucus and, like Weir, participated in all six years of the review.

"The industry committees involved people much closer to the business at hand and, because of that, they worked well. These working groups are what should be built on and used more regularly," Arbogast says.

In the end, employers and workers agreed to virtually all regulation proposals. The body of regulations and approximately 100 outstanding proposals - including those concerning the exposure limit for formaldehyde and servicing records for mobile equipment - were referred to the WCB Panel of Administrators for decision.

Now that the regulations have passed into law, much more work lies ahead. Of the 4,000 regulations, almost 1,000 are either entirely new or represent a changed standard of compliance. To help employers and workers understand which of the new regulations affect them and how, the WCB Prevention Division is planning a variety of support services, including information sessions around the province and new or revised publications and videos. A series of guides geared to small business is in the works as well.

The WCB is also developing policy and operating instructions that will guide Board officers in their application of the regulations starting April 15, 1998. A one-year phase-in period for compliance will follow for most regulations.


